## LIB DEMS URGE EARLY START ON NEW CHETWYND BRIDGE

During 20 years of Conservative control, the County Council simply kicked the issue of structural problems with the bridge into the long grass, culminating in possible complete closure by 2022.

Our campaign to stop closure helped win back Mease Valley for the Lib Dems in 2023.

Staffordshire County Council can't simply rely on central government money to build the new replacement bridge.

The Lib Dems will continue to press SCC to prioritise the new bridge as being vital for both Alrewas and the Mease Valley villages and the economy of nearby Tamworth, not to mention for access to the National Memorial Arboretum.

## REOPENED RAILWAY VITAL FOR NEW SETTLEMENT

A likely option for a new settlement in the emerging Lichfield District Plan is on land opposite the A38 from Alrewas and Fradley. Lib Dems say that any such development must be conditional on the reopening of passenger services between Lichfield and Burton with one or two stations to serve Alrewas and Fradley.



Lib Dem Cllr Phil Bennion (Mease Valley) has met with County transport officers to stress the importance of the County Council strongly supporting the rail reopening. Without the rail link, traffic on the A38 will be intolerable with rail commuters heading into Lichfield.

### TORIES VOTE AGAINST LIB DEM MOTION

Lib Dems win vote calling for research on solar panels and a greener community

In July, Lib Dem Cllr Hugh Ashton (Stowe) introduced a motion to Lichfield District Council calling for an analysis of installing solar panels over Council properties, including car parks.

The motion was eventually passed, with all Conservatives and Independents and the sole Reform member voting against it, with all Lib Dems and Labour councillors voting in favour.

Ashton comments, "I am disappointed that the Conservatives, despite their pledges for a greener and forward-looking Lichfield District, are determined to play party politics when they meet constructive proposals from outside their party. Lichfield deserves better than this."

Low turnouts in local elections show widespread distrust of politics.

Lib Dem leader Ed Davey is the only major political leader calling out Farage and his followers, pointing out that most British people do not want Trump-style government. We agree that we need controls around im-

Reform UK are now running many county councils, including Staffordshire – and they are already showing poor management and divisive politics.

#### **CITY CENTRE PLAN SLAMMED BY LIB DEMS**

The plans for the Birmingham Road Site opposite Lichfield City station are just not right for Lichfield.

We say:

- they are so unimaginative. They create just big blocks of housing in the centre of our beautiful city.
- the plans involve just too many homes on this site: over 300.
- the original plan was that there would open space where people can meet, have a coffee and relax. That has been replaced with another block of housing (edged in red).

The original objective was to make this development a place of impact and style as it is a gateway into the city. These plans just do not achieve that.



The Conservatives and Labour support these plans but your Lib Dem councillors do not. We say that we can do so much better with the Birmingham Road Site.
